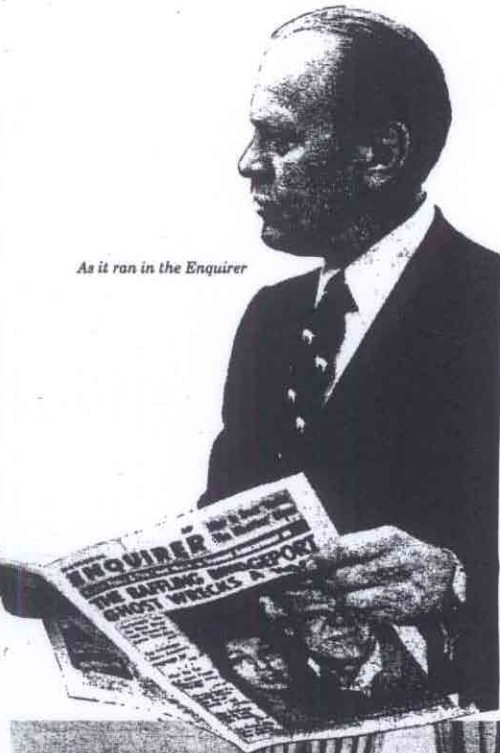
A Further Note . . .

To accompany Randy Fitzgerald's article on the National Enquirer's Washington connection ("A Tabloid Romances Washington," Aug. 6), we ran a photo of President Gerald Ford reading a copy of the Enquirer, with this caption: "No one seems to know where the original is of this photograph, reprinted from the National Enquirer . . . Nor can it be determined who snapped it. The Enquirer says it's a White House photo. Ford personal photographer David Kennerly says he didn't take it and the White House says it's not theirs."

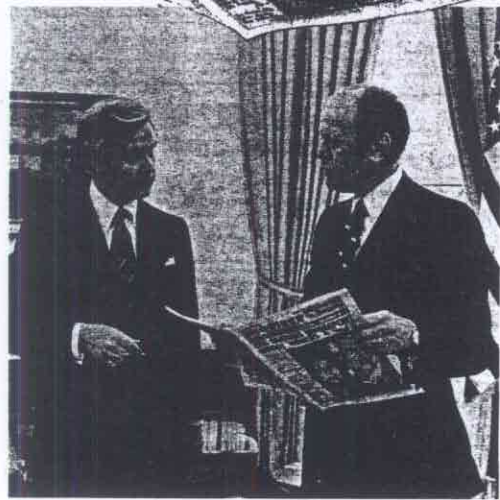
Since then we have learned that the original photo apparently appeared earlier this year in the Sunday Spectator of Hornell, N.Y., located near the country home of Henry O. Dormann, the former Enquirer executive whose romancing of Washington politicians is at least partly responsible for the paper's present success. The Spectator pictured Dormann showing President Ford a copy of the Enquirer during a visit to the Oval Office. Apparently Dormann, who orchestrated a promotional film narrated by Chet Huntley and featuring laudatory comments about the Enquirer from Senators Mark Hatfield, Frank Church and Barry Goldwater and Rep. Shirley Chisholm, once again lived up to Fitzgerald's characterization of him as a "flamboyant publicist": it would seem the Enquirer cropped Dormann from the photo and ran the picture of Ford with the headline, "President and Mrs. Gerald Ford belong to the Enquirer's wonderful, ever-growing family of readers."

According to Fitzgerald, "Ford found himself suckered into promoting the Enquirer with alarming regularity."
