GARRISON MOVES Work Purportedly Refers

to Kennedy Murder

The district attorney's office The district attorney's office has subpensed a "diary" which reportedly refers to a man who mentioned in April, 1963, the possibility of President John F. Kennedy's being killed with a high-powered rifle fired from a building.

The subpens directs Florida Assistant Attorney General Seymour Gelber to deliver the work to the District Attorney's office by 10:30 a.m. Oct. 8.

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Production of the diary is necessary for the investigation into an elleged conspiracy to murder Kennedy, the subpena said.

The wanted material was described as:

"A certain diary and notes kept. by Mr. Seymour Gelber

kept by Mr. Seymour Gelber while an assistant district attorney in Dade County, Florida, during an investigation conducted by the state's attorney for Dade County into activities of extremist groups."

Assistant District Attorney James L. Alcock said Gelber was an assistant to state's at-

was an assistant to state's atwas an assistant to state's attorney (D.A.) Richard Gerstein of Dade County when he wrote the lengthy account.

"pop up" in the work.

The diary also refers to
Joseph Milteer, a Georgian, and Joseph Milteer, a Georgian, and Willie Somersette, a Miami intelligence agent who infiltrated a group to which Milteer belonged before the assassination. Somersette has been to the district attorney's office for an interview, Alcock said. Alcock said that Milteer and Somersette became acquiainted at a meeting at the Miami Fontainebleau Motor Hotel in April, 1963.

There Milteer reportedly told Somersette that he believed Kennedy would be assassinated before his term was up.

Alcock said a tape recording of a similar conversation was later made in Miami. Milteer reportedly also mentioned the high-powered rifle.
