right-wing party's headquarters and as home for 12 years to Stoner, who is serving a 10-year prison term in Alabama for the 1958 bombing of a black Birmingham church. No one was hurt in the bombing.

Jerry Ray, who is serving as caretaker of the property pending Stoner's release from prison, said he was gone for little more than a halfhour Saturday morning and returned to find the building ransacked, windows broken and chains on the gate cut open.

Cobb County Magistrate Court Judge T.O. Stardivant issued the warrant late Saturday for Fields, who lives in Marietta. Sturdivant said two witnesses saw two men break into the house and drive away in a light blue car.

Contacted late Saturday afternoon, Fjelds said he had no word about the warrant and knew nothing of the break-in. He did say, "That's my building and my property in there."

Marietta police Detective Kar Reibly said he tried to talestingerprints in the area handled none. Reibly said intruders were "probably tabiliar with the area, because the dogs were undisturbed."

Ray, who asked for the arrest warrant, said, "It must have been

Christian Rights' counterclaims were filed Friday afternoon in the form of briefs in Cobb County Superior Court.

One brief claims that Fields assaulted former Christian Rights board member the Rev. R.B. Montgomery on May 17, 1983, and that "Fields suddenly and without provocation held a pistol in his band" and "threatened to quote blow the brains out of the defendant (Montgomery)."

An attorney for Montgomery said he knew of no criminal charges that have been filed in connection with the alleged incident.

Montgomery, a Pentecostal minister from Forest Park, is asking for \$400,000 for physical harm, emotional disruption and lost money. Montgomery is a former mainbag of Christian Rights Inc.

The counterclaims filed in the cobb Superior Court were by Wilson, who asks for \$100,000 in damages; Montgomery; Christian Rights secretary Dorothy Hickley, who is asking for \$200,000 in damages; and Christian Rights board member Amy Wilmont, of Jacksonville, Fla, who responded but had no monetary request attached.
