Rightists Open New Offices

The right-wing National Youth Alliance, reorganized and revitalized in part by defectors from the old American Nazi Party, has opened new offices in Georgetown with a bookstore for anti-Zionists, scientific racists and other ideologues of the right.

"It's sort of the hub of youth in D.C.," the new NYA national organizer, Robert A. Lloyd, said of Georgetown, noted for its posh boutiques, hippie culture and fashionable restored homes.

"We're here because we

don't want to sequester ourselves away from the youth of the country," Lloyd said.

Formed in the spring of 1969 from the remains of the Youth For Wallace movement in the 1968 presidential campaign, NYA opened first near Dupont Circle, another popular hippie meeting place.

It outgrew its available space there, according to leaders, and the move to 1656 Wisconsin Ave. NW in Georgetown was made.

The new location includes a "Western Destiny" bookstore, the only such storein Washington that provides a broad selection of philosophical and political tracts, anthropological treatises on white or Aryan superiority, Nazi apologetics and assorted books alleging a Zionist conspiracy to undermine Western civilization.

The store's number one book (and primer of NYA) is "Imperium," by Francis Parker Yockey—a weighty treatise warning of the impending demise of Western civilization unless the influence of "culture distorters"—m a in ly Jews, Negroes, Orientals and others— is removed.

A portion of the bookstore's inventory, according to Lloyd, comes from the now closed bookstore of the National Socialist White Peoples Party (formerly the American Nazi Party) in Arlington.

Lloyd himself was executive officer of the NSWPP but quit during a recent party split and joined NYA. He became national organizer, succeeding Louis T. Byers who was elevated to

the newly created position of NYA president. Another ex-NSWPP member, writer William Pierce, is also an NYA friend, Byers said, but is not on the payroll.

Since early 1969, Byers and a small staff have been organizing NYA chapters on college campuses across the country to fight drugs, black militancy and left-wing radicalism, with force when deemed necessary.

He claims now to have more than 8,000 members with a large portion of them organized into 62 campus chapters, ranging from the University of Chicago and New York University to Kent State University in Ohio.

Working with a 25,400-member mailing list for financial support, NYA has rapidly increased its administrative workload in the last year and will at least double its present staff of four in the next few months, Byers said.

The bookstore now has about 300 titles and will expand to 500 soon, Lloyd said.
