This is not precisely what the earlier report says of Brady. It does not say he might be able to identify the people in the pictures but knows Cubans, which is not the same thing.

Also, he did not "move" to the Philippines. He was deported after his second morals-law violation with a young boy. If the T-series of informants is federal, the informant knew better. The FBI also should have known better, for it is part of the deporting department of the government.

Relative to the location of WILLIAM CUTHBERT BRADY, named on December 2, 1963, by Mrs. DOLORES HEKLEY, Secretary, Room 101, International Trade Mart, New Orleans, Louisiana, as possibly in a position to identify individuals represented in photographs taken on August 16, 1963, at the International Trade Mart, 124 Camp Street, New Orleans, Louisiana, and furnished for the use of the FBI by television station WDSU, Confidential Informant Dallas T-17 advised that approximately the first week in August, 1963, BRADY moved to the Philippine Islands and was residing in the city of Manila.

CD3, p. 414 Thomas Kennair, Dolores Nealey, Oswald's literature distribution, pictures by WOSU and WFL

This seemingly negative report has value, aside from its additional confirmation of the Oswald helper and general conformity in his general description. It is strange that the FBI says Kennair "recognized" the other man without identifying him.

Aside from the WFL film, there were pictures, this says, taken by WFL. This is both likely and of a certain potential importance. The WFL studios are close to the scene. WFL also operated official government propaganda broadcasts through its radio affiliates, under Dr. Isaac Casariego. This was a CIA operation. Were Oswald seeking to establish a CIA cover, the broadcast of his "pro-Castro" activities by WFL could have helped
