MOST INTERESTING campaign booklet of 1968 did not emanate from Hubert Humphrey. It's "The Almanac of Poor Richard Nixon" published by the World Publishing Company of Cleveland and New York and contains Nixon quotes some of which he can be proud of, some not.

Here is one regarding his Democratic opponent for the Senate in California, Helen Gahagan Douglas: "Next to Vito Marcantonio who admittedly follows a Communist line in the House of Representatives, Mrs. Douglas has probably been the most outspoken and vocal critic of the House Un-American Activities Committee. If she had her way, the Communist conspiracy would never have been exposed, and instead of being a convicted perjurer, Alger Hiss would still be influencing the foreign policy of the United States."

Another interesting little booklet is patterned after the sayings of Chairman Mao and is called "Quotations from the Would-Be Chair m a n." Published by the Public Affairs Press in Washington, it contains thousands of quotes from "Poor Richrd Nixon's very own words."
