> In related matters, Mac-Gregor also said yesterday that:

· The cash fund was not involved in the financing of an alleged spying and espionage campaign that federal investigators have said was basic re-election strategy conceived by high White House aides.

· He objects to the association of this alleged spying and disruption with the Watergate bugging, which he said was clearly deplorable and illegal.

• Dwight L. Chapin, the President's appointments secretary, was "not involved" with California attorney Donald H. Segretti, an alleged saboteur, though Chapin helped Segretti obtain a job in the Treasury Department. News stories in The Washington Post, The New York Times and Time magazine have linked Chapin and Segretti. 100
