"Southern University is a black school under the control of a state Board of Education which has no members who are black," the report said. "This fact evidentally caused

much of the students' frustration, confusion and distrust that led to the unrest on the campus in October and November, 1972."

During that period there were demonstrations, including a march to the state Capitol. Incidents of vandalism, including fires and window breaking, become common.

Guste said he had turned over all the testimony and information to an East Baton Rouge Parish grand jury. As to the likelihood of indictments, "I have no comment on that," he said.

The 12-member commission which drew up the report was Appointed by Guste and included Turner Catledge, former executive editor of The New York Times, two Southern students, and New Orleans attorney Revius Ortique, who served as a member of the President's Commission Campus Unrest which investigated shootings at Kent State and Jackson State Universities.
