Goldwater said the 1972 election was a vote of confidence in an administration which ended the Vietnam war on honorable terms and promised decentralization of government authority and reductions in federal spending at home.

He said that Watergate would never have happened if the Nixon staff had been made up of experienced professionals "strongly committed to the principles of conservatism," but that it was the liberals, not the conservatives, who first "promoted the idea that dissenters should choose what laws they would obey and which they would ignore."

He said that the "vicious double standard" in no way excuses the crimes of Watergate," nor obscures the fact that conservatives, because of Watergate, "will have to fight and fight hard to retain the ground they have won over the past 10 to 15 years."

Sen. Jesse Helms (R-N.C.), in a morning speech to YAF members also accepted Presient Nixon's thesis that the wlessness of social activists lawlessness of social activities in the 1960s created the climate for the Watergate abuses

"I wish he had been somewhat more precise about the bums who were trying to destroy this country throughout the 1960s, thus giving the motivation to the Watergate stupidity," said Helms.

"I have no taste for bugging and burglary, but I have an absolute abhorrence for the kind of traitorous conduct which triggered a crisis in trying to protect the security and the safety of this republic," he said.
