Rhodes Urges Quick Vote on Impeachment

United Press International House Minority Leader John J. Rhodes (R-Ariz.) yesterday called on the House Judiciary Committee to hold limited hearings and vote promptly, yes or no, on a reso-lution to impeach President Nixon.

Rhodes, who succeeded Vice President Gerald R. Ford as minority leader, said in an interview that the House would give the committee subpoena powers soon after it reconvenes Monday.

He suggested that a way would be found to give the House group access to information held by Watergate Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski if the Judiciary Committee limited its subpoena requests to what was "reasonable" and avoided what Rhodes labeled as the "shotgun" approach of
