President Nixon yesterday pledged full support to Republican candidates and said that he would continue his own grass-roots campaign to win public support.

The President met for more than an hour with Republican National Chairman George Bush, Sen. Bill Brock (Tenn.), chairman of the Senate Republican Campaign Committee, and Rep. Robert H. Mi-chel (Ill.), chairman of the House Republican Campaign Committee, on this year's elec-

The President told the group he would address the fund-raising dinner to be held here Wednesday evening to raise money for Republican Robert Traxler. House and Senate candidates.

Earlier, press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said that reaction to the President's recent apperances in Chicago, Nashville and Houston had been "extremely good" and that the President will continue to "speak out" in his defense.
