The easier way is just to increase the taxes, throw he private health care system out and let the Government do

In this vein, he said, "When go to a hospital, or when I call a doctor, I want that doctient and not for the Federal Government and that is what this is all about."

Before he arrived here yesterday for a long weekend in the sun, Mr. Nixon underwent his annual physical examination -he was described in "excelent condition"-hy a team of armed services doctors at the naval hospital in Bethesda, Md.
