Nixon's Popularity Shows New Decline

PRINCETON, N.J.,—Public discontent over soaring prices, coupled with a continuing skepticism based on Watergate, are taking a toll on President Nixon's popularity.

In the latest nationwide survey, 35 per cent of all persons interviewed express approval of the way Nixon is handling his job as president, while 55 per cent disapprove. This represents a decline of three percentage points in his approval rating since the previous measurement, taken soon after Nixon's televised Aug. 15 speech on Watergate.

The latest approval figure is four points above Nixon's low point of 31 per cent, recorded in early August.

President's lowest The rating since he has been in office (31 per cent) was recorded in an early August survey, following several weeks of televised hearings on Watergate. That rating represented a drop of 37 points from Nixon's high of 68 per cent recorded last January following the Vietnam peace settlement—the most precipitous drop yet recorded for any president in a seven-month period. It was also the lowest rating given any president in 20years-since Jan. 1953, when only 31 per cent registered approval in President Truman's final month in office.

This is the question which has been asked about the incumbent president since the Roosevelt years to measure presidential popularity.

Do you approve or disapprove of the way Nixon is handling his job as President?
