

Tricia Writes On Watergate

Tricia Nixon Cox has written a 1,500-word defense of "My Father and Watergate" which has been given to a women's magazine to publish free.

Mrs. Cox says she received no White House assistance, and wrote in longhand on a yellow legal size pad similar to those used by the President. Editing, she added, was provided by her husband, attorney Edward Finch Cox.

The article is described as a "harsher" and "more explosive" indictment of President Nixon's critics than anything her sister, Julie, has said publicly thus far.

"It sounds sometimes like the President himself when he gets mad," said one source. "I didn't know she was that much like her father."

It is the first time that Mrs. Cox has evidenced any interest in writing, although her sister has already made her debut as a fledgling author in The Saturday Evening Post.
