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Politics Criticized By Nixon Relative

Being poor may be bad, but it beats being in politics, one of President Nixon's poor relations said here yesterday.

"I'd rather be on welfare than in a bunch of gamblersism and I've about come to the conclusion that's all politics is," said Alma Millhouse, 49.

Mrs. Millhouse, whose late husband, Philip, is the President's first cousin, said she receives \$46 a month in state disability aid.

Their son, Ronald, 28, appeared in Federal court this week in Sacramento to file for bankruptcy after suffering reverses in the bull market.

Mrs. Millhouse attacked poverty favoring to politics in commenting about the Watergate conspiracy, which has shaken the Administration of her famous kinsman.

"We teach our morals at home. We teach our children to respect our country. Our elected officials should be people our children can

respect, but you read in the paper every day about something dirty," Mrs. Millhouse said.

"I think I might be getting in hot water," she said, and then she shrugged. "I'm not really interested in all that scandal stuff."
