Connally, the one-time Democrat said.

It was reported today theat prosecutor that Connally accepted the \$10,000 for helping the Associated Milk Producers (AMP), the nation's largest dairy cooperative.

When convention officials learned in the early hours of Saturday that stories were being published reporting that Mr. Jacobson was planning to testify against Mr. Connally, they discussed the possibility of "disinviting" Mr. Connally.

But republican state chairman Harold Jones vetoed the plan and the Texan was given a warm reception.
