The Nixons are paying off the mortgage on the property at a 7½ per cent interest rate, deputy press secretary Gerald L. Warren said.

Dean III, separately told reporters in the last year that a 20-acre tract surrounding the Nixons' San Clemente complex was not sold, when in fact the President and his wife disposed of It in December, 1970.
