

Nixon-Psychological Dr. Bernard C. Meyer's letter, NYTimes 1/22/74

At last the shrinks have caught up with us. In saying there is no authentic Nixon self, Dr. Meyer is saying what we have been saying, that Nixon is a copier and an improviser. ("... decks himself out in the shreds and patches of other personalities and thinks and ~~acts~~ talks 'as if' he were they," hence "As If" personality.
