WASHINGTON — When lines of cars around service stations were growing longer and longer, Nixon could have been faced with a choice between two paths. One was to do nothing, let the crisis continue, and hope that it would pass. The other was to take some action, even if it was only a gesture.

"You think the president Nixon is so clever," Nixon's chief of staff, "we've worked our image."
