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Migrants in U.S. Send Protest To Puerto Rico

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Aug. 14 (AP)-About 1,000 migrant workers in Western Massachusetts have signed a letter to the Puerto Rican government protesting poor working con-

The letter also criticized negotiating procedures by the Puerto Rican Department of Labor, which negotiates contracts for the workers with shade tobacco growers, according to the director of the Springfield-based New England Farm Workers' Council, Mar-cel M. Ringawa.

Ringawa charged that rep-resentatives of the workers have not been included in the contract talks, and that contract supervision by the labor department has been incomplete.

The letter lists grievances in housing, medical treatment pay and of costs in company dormitories.
