## Police prope shooting of JFK witness

NASHVIILE, Tenn. (UPI) — Police detectives are continuing their probe of the reported shooting of <u>Gordon Novel</u>, an elusive witness in New Orleans Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison's Kennedy assassination investigation. Police, however, insisted no formal complaint was filed and said they were acting only on "second hand" information that Novel was nicked in the should er by one of several builets reported fired into a news van b e l o n g i n g to Radio Station WKDA.

Gary Edwards, WKDA news, director, said the shooting occured early Sunday as he and Novel parked the van outside Edwards' apartment.

"WE have had no official complaint" that an attempt was made on Nover's life, Lt. Noble Brymer said, but police began investigating after news media contacted police headquarters requesting information about the shooting.

"There appeared to be several builet holes in the truck," Brymer said, "and there was a little blood on the door bandle."

Dick Buckley, program director of WKDA, sild Edwards and Novel left the city immediately after the shooting in a car they borrowed from a triend.

Novel was said to have been treated for the gunshot wound in Kentucky and the pair then reportedly split up with Novel going to Columbus, Ohio, and Edwards going to Washington, D.C.

WKDA station manager Charles F. Walker said Novel has given Edwards "exclusive interviews" concerning the Garrison investigation.

Edwards has said he will soon release the tape recorded interviews, which he claims will seriously damage Garrison's investigation.

Walker said Novel had been, staying at a local botel under an assumed name, and had with him taped recordings, films and "documented evidence" tohno piled while working as an investigator for Garrison.
