Two young women who rented the French Quarter apartment, where Novel lived before leaving New Orleans; said they while the two women were cleaning.

Novel has been staying at Commbus, Ohio, and fighting extradition back to New Orleans, where Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison wants him as a material witness in the investigation of the assassination of President John F. Kemnedy.

The young women, who asked that their names be withheld, said an intruder methodically searched through cabinets, dresser drawers, personal papers and clothes.

A television set and a radio were stolen, but Asst. Dist. Atty. Andrew Sciambra said he believed the theft was "no more than a cover."

Although reports of the letter finding had not been published by the New Orleans States-Item when the apartment was entered, the newspaper said a number of persons knew it had been discovered in Novel's former lodgings.

The finding of the letter prompted Steve Plotkin, Novel's prompted Steve Plotkin, Novel's attorney, to confirm newspaper reports that his client had worked for the Central Intelligence Agency here during 1961.

The letter draft was handwrit-ten in pencil on pages from a yellow legal pad. It asked "Mr. Weisa" to help him get away before he was forced to testify about possible "top secret" matters related to an operation named "Double-Chek Corpora-tion of Miami."
