...Nelson Rockefeller's CIA inquiry, meanwhile, continued with an interrogation of National Security Counsil staffer Richard Ober, who had headed the supersecret CIA unit that spied on antiwar dissidents in the U.S. and abroad. Ober's testimony was not released, but the Vice President had already told TV interviewers, "I think we are going to find that the answer is 'yes' to charges that the CIA exceeded its authority by conducting domestic surveillance...

Knowing this at the outset, an investigation determined to get all there was to know from incriminated witnesses would have held the Obers to the end, not begun with them.
