I'll be glad to have the suggestions you will make re Waketh but please do try, hard as it may be, to understand that while I have something to get on paper for the future, this is priority. I'll be glad to read the suggestions and to file ~~the~~ with the manuscripts originals. Including the real stupidity of confusing Stevenson with Carroll, which I think has been added.

On Waketh, there are two epilogues. I urge you not to omit the second.

My New Zealand friend moved and I do not have his New address. His silence tells me all I need to know besides the fact that he abandoned the project before getting any of it on paper.

McKnight is a painstakingly careful writer. And a fine one.
