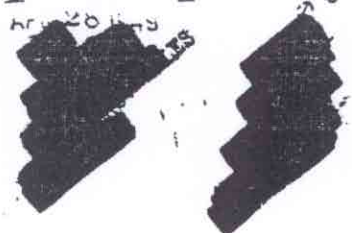

Early in October, 1948, [REDACTED] discovered a legal provision which prohibits any state agency from hiring special counsel without the Attorney General's approval. [REDACTED] immediately cracked down on WARREN OLNEY III, Chief Counsel for the Crime Commission, and ordered him cut off the State payroll. Governor WARREN ordered OLNEY to stay on the job. "Mr. OLNEY," he said, "was appointed pursuant to statute and direct legislative authorization for the establishment of the Crime Commission." Governor WARREN said OLNEY would continue with the Commission even "if I have to pay his salary personally."
