Dutch Newsmen's Latest Claim in JFK Case

The Hague

Dutch journalist Willem Olsmans said yesterday he has found a new witness ready to identify the person who ordered the assassination of President Kennedy.

Olsmans said at a news conference, "I'm ready only to make him known to President Carter him-

self." He added that he would refuse to testify again before the U.S. House committee on assassinations, which he called highly shabby, leaky, ridiculous.

He said he had sent a message to that effect to Carter.

"This key witness is on the highest level of the U.S. establish-

ment," Olsmans said. "He is not at the moment in the United States. He is in a position to identify who ordered the killing of John F. Kennedy; he can reveal the entire matter from A to Z."

Olsmans said he will fly to Washington on Sunday and hold a news conference there next Tuesday. If Carter refuses to see him,

Olsmans said, he has "other ways" of revealing his witness. He would not elaborate.

Olsmans, who has written a book titled, "A Report on the Kennedy Assassins," has talked to the House assassination committee three times this year.

According to committee

sources, he said a man called George de Mohrenschildt told him he served as a go-between for Texas oilmen and Lee Harvey Oswald. The committee staff tried to contact De Mohrenschildt, but he committed suicide before they could talk to him.

"I will not again give any names to the House assassination

committee," Olsmans said. "I don't trust them. I don't think they know how to handle the job."

Olsmans said he had received proof that Texas oilman Lamar Hunt had nothing to do with the assassination and said information given him by De Mohrenschildt concerning Hunt "was wrong."

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
