

Unexpert Analysis On Oswald Deplored

CHICAGO, Feb. 25—A professional thinking," said psychiatrist said today he was "astonished" to find nothing valid in the Warren Commission report on the personality and motives of Lee Oswald, accused assassin of President Kennedy.

He proposed a new study involving "individuals of significance" in Oswald's life, including his mother and his former wife, Marina.

Dr. Maier Tuchler of Phoenix blamed the dearth of sound psychiatric information on the absence of psychiatrists plus the Commission's practice, "common to a group of intellectuals, of functioning as lay psychiatrists."

"I am appalled at conclusions that involve psychiatric evaluations and judgments without the benefit of trained

professional thinking," said Tuchler.

Tuchler spoke on a panel discussion of the American Academy of Forensic Sciences here.

Tuchler praised the Warren report as putting to rest rumors that a conspiracy was involved.

"I am more concerned with the particular issue that the report presumes to cover through pages of rationalization, comment and opinion expressed on the personality of Oswald in the absence of any medically or psychiatrically qualified staff member.

"Here to my mind lies the weakness of the Warren report, but it is not too late to supplement the lay psychiatric opinions with a conservative professional study."
