Dear Faul,

Today is the lest of Lil's employment, so from new on my day will be less broken up, more conducive to continuous work, as in writing, where I shominate interruptions of any kind. have spending odds and bits of time lately in trying to integrate more of the unclassified filesk into the primitive classification improvise as I gox, with carding on much. Esginning early this s.m. I want over the file of correspondence with you and removed your memos, etc, and filed them by subject. I will refer to each below. If I fail to mention any, I hope when you have time you will send me m copy it it, or them.

It is a great tragedy that we had no integrated filing system available to us, for this makes one of the major problems of ratrieval of information. As time goes on and I forget more, or am unable to keep so much in mind, this becomes more soute. I was often reminded of this as I glanced through this file.

For example, a brief Schmitt note on Gaudet: I had forgotten he had noted that Gaudet was the source on the Suby painting purches from Larry Borenstein. You have my memo on my interview with Borenstein. When months ago Garrison and Moo both asked me to see Borenstein, first speaking to Bethell, who had gotten nothing from him, Tom raised so much fuss I didn't. I finally met him by accident. I wish I had been able to see him slone. Someone, including strangers, was always with us. Once it was a friend of Thornley's, who I know fairly well and do not trust, not alone for this reason. His name is Jack Burnside.

Digressions: Borenstein 1 am told is Trotsky's nephew and may possibly be a millioneire today. In any event, the indications are he is quite rich.

From the same source, a former Bay of ligs prisoner who has been friendly, I learn that Gaudet has seemed to be a "Luftmensch", who folded his magazine lest month. He apparently was able to get support (including financial) from Latin American governments and other sources enabling him to survive previous financial crises. It had not known of the graduation of Harvey M. Meers (Times-Picayune 5/26/68) from West Point) but there are two similarly-maned Gaudets in N.C. and when you see the complete version of COUN you'll see the address of the right one. I have added much on him. There is also a second publication with the same name as his (source ibid), the second of the litizens' Committee for a Free substitute. Bethel, editor. At this point, while I was changing paper, I got a phone call from Moc. In a way it is encouraging. He is going over the files, weeding cut all the leads to "onstanticple, Bengkok and all the other things outside of N.C. he is now interested in these many leads they did not and could not follow because of all the primrose paths they trad. I suppose this means Shew-Ferris connections. Enyway, they are finding interesting things, some possibly wrong or unimportant (like a reference to weweld giving out leaflets on Gravier Street).

12/12/67, your thoughts about the Allen-Scott Beport. They undoubtedly have the Senate Internal Security, House Unamericans and FBI among their sources. They have had SISC stuff fed them.

12/21/67, Unidentified men: Do I have your letters on this? If not, may I, please?

12/17/67, suigley: Is it not present strenge that there is no report from him on this esemingly important thing before the end of the Commission's life? Is there so ething not here I do not now recall. Very odd. If you have a copy of the "ehrer story, I'd like to read it carefully. I know a writer by that name. He was not unfriendly when we met. In connection with this mame, you may want to recall one I sent you after speaking to Barbara Heid about her intervies with comeons who knew Quiglet well and a comparison between this and the report boxley wrote. The took him along. His was entirely inadewaste.
