Leasing Agent of the Cross Country Development Corporation, a subsidiary of Bloomfield Building Industries, 3355 Poplar Avenue, Memphis, Tennessee, advised as follows:

LAWRENCE spent about ten weeks at the New Orleans sub-office of Cross Country Development Corporation, located Room 101 of the International Trade Mart, 124 Camp Street, New Orleans, middle of October of 1963. He was there to handle leasing arrangements for a new International Trade Mart being constructed by Bloomfield Building Industries.

On a day probably in middle August, Lawrence met recalled. JAMES LAWRENCE left the page Mart, building he accompanied by Mr. BRIGGS NELSON, an employee of Bloomfield Building Industries, and he received from him news of the building by another acquaintance, namely, JACK FARNOLD, then employed a Room 101, The Hotel Orleans, opposite to the building. LAWRENCE made arrangements young white male who were reported some sort of producer. One of these parties referred to Mr. NELSON and one started to show it to LAWRENCE, at which time both Mr. NELSON and LAWRENCE noted that someone was taking movies of their series of events.

Mrs. NELSON recognized the photographer as being someone working for the television station in New Orleans. LAWRENCE does not recall his name, nor the name of the station, but it is understood that Mrs. NELSON asked the television station to whom his purpose in taking the movie and photograph was to the effect that the photographs did not know that he had merely been told by his station to hurry to New Orleans to take photographs or to do something on the television station. LAWRENCE was requested to do something on the television station, and he agreed to do something on the television station.

LAWRENCE was prohibited a series of six photographic taken by him on August 16, 1963.

With regard to photograph marked by S. LAWRENCE as through "1", S. LAWRENCE recalled him to be a person named Mr. GREGORY, son of whom there was no photographic, and further identified Mr. GREGORY as the person marked. Mr. GREGORY is described as being in his late thirties, having short dark hair, brown eyes, and wearing a dark suit jacket, white shirt, and dark trousers. He was pointing out with strong air of certainty that he was during his head, bowed and who is depicted as being identified with JACK FARNOLD, Room Clerk, Roger Bros. Hotel, New Orleans, Louisiana, who had accompanied Mr. NELSON and LAWRENCE out of the Trade Mart a few moments before the photograph was taken. He further said that he is certain in his own mind that FARNOLD had nothing to do with the distribution of the literature and would further, for certain, that it is his belief that certain of the literature was distributed by the Trade Mart, believed by him to be Mr. HALLIGAN, a carpet contractor. Mr. HALLIGAN would have had nothing to do with the distribution of this literature. And in his opinion, he had been negligent in taking on such interested or

photograph taken by him on August 16, 1963.

WILLIAMS stated that he was rather shocked and surprised to see the remaining eight photographs taken, television as a part of a movie taken by an unaccredited person. At the time that he was in New Orleans, Louisiana, he was not like Harvey SWANSON had purportedly passed out photographs. He also stated that this movie
