again, have the FBI introduce leads it should have followed and didn't pursue early the men named at the end, Will Herbert Brady, about whom, for sure, the FBI knew. If it failed to get rumors of Oswald's connection with him, it had to have tried very hard not to. Brady was deported and has returned to Canada, where, according to my last information, from Ivan Bottman earlier this year, he is in East Village, NYC, operating another series of discussion groups and editing a rightist journal. Brady was flagrant homosexual. It is interesting that Nealey believed Brady had the kind of knowledge "relative to this matter" that would be of value to the FBI. The New Mexican Academy is a military school.

Perhaps it is not unusual, but it does seem like less than news speed for the New Mexico photographer not to rush his film for processing. Most stations used Pan-American, or imports. It could seem that before cutting, and likewise, as this seems, the film would have been disposed of so the evening newspaper could have been prepared. I recall no such mention of Bush's name. There is no Johnson in the 1967 directory(phone).

Her descriptions of the distributors is consistent with those of others and would indicate pictures had been taken of them, altho yet the Commission seems not to have been able to locate proper ones. It was not October 16.

This possibly unwarranted speculation should be recorded. Brady's discussion group could have attracted Oswald. There are rumors he was there, including from one of Brady's former lovers. If Nealey, Brady's friend, had been there, she could have met Oswald. This report does not include the usual FBI bit, that the witness didn't know Oswald, etc. In fact, it seems to deal with him familiarly, not even mentioning his first names and by the use of "on this occasion", suggest an earlier one of which she had no ledge or where she met him. It is also possible to wonder if Andrews knew Nealey, for in his testimony (113329) he identifies as someone he knew "this young lady", not one of the "Nealey-Mazs sisters. Licher, who had to have known of the repetition of the Nealey name, made no effort to jog Andrews' recollection. It would be good to comb the Andrews reports and indexes for the "Nealey name and for that of Brady, Bush, Alice, etc. This report flags interest.
