
Grand Jury Subpena Goes to Marina Oswald Porter



SHE'LL COME TO NEW ORLEANS "if necessary," says Marina Oswald Porter as she gestures in a Dallas, Tex., interview Wednesday. Mrs. Porter, widow of accused presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald, said she would appear as a material witness in District Attorney Jim Garrison's probe of the Kennedy assassination if she had to. Garrison has issued a subpena for her.

An Orleans Parish grand jury subpena for the former Mrs. Marina Oswald, widow of Lee Harvey Oswald, was obtained by the district attorney's office Wednesday.

Assistant Dist. Atty. James
L. Alcock said his office
wants to ask the woman, now
Mrs. Kenneth Jess Porter, of
Richardson, Tex., about activities and associates of
Oswald in New Orleans before the assassination of
President John F. Kennedy.

Feb. 8 and 9 are the days specified for testimony before the jury.

Marina has said she believes Oswald killed President Kennedy. She also has denied knowing any of the persons Dist. Atty Jim Garrison has accused of plotting Kennedy's death with Oswald.

Alcock said his office has "some very interesting questions to ask Mrs. Oswald."

AFRAID OF GARRISON

"We have indications she was with Lee when he talked to people we are interested in," he added later.

Contacted by telephone, Mrs. Porter said of her subpena, "It's a surprise to me." In response to another question shapped said she did not think she could contribute anything to Garrison's investigation of Kennedy's death.

Asked if she plans to come to New Orleans, she said, "No, but I may have to."

She said she would "hate to go down there because Mr. Garrison is so powerful. I don't know if I could prove my innocence to him."

She said she talked to attorneys for Clay L. Shaw, charged with conspiring to kill Kennedy, last year. "I told them I would testify in his trial," she said.

'DOESN'T KNOW SHAW'

However, she added that this does not mean she knows anything about Shaw.

"I just want to do the right thing if he is an innocent man," she said. "But I don't think I could help in Mr. Garrison's work."

A copy of the subpena was to be sent to Dallas District Attorney Henry Wade, Alcock said. Richardson is a suburb of Dallas.

If Mrs. Porter refuses to honor the subpena, she will get a court hearing. The court then will decide if her testimony is material or if it
