The Senate Republican leader made his accusation before a special Senate subcommittee meeting on confirmation of Mr. Otepka to a \$36,000 job as a member of the Subversive Activities Control Board.

Mr. Otepka has been the center of a security and political controversy since 1963 when Dean Rusk, then Secretary of State, dismissed him from his State Department security jobs.

**Nigerians Report Capture of Town** 

LAGOS, Nigeria, April 15 (AP)-The Nigerian Army reported today that it had captured the Biafran town of Bende, about 10 miles northeast of Umuahia, the secessionists' administrative capital

The town, which had a prewar population of about 20,7 000, is seven miles southeast of Uzuakoli, which the lederal army occupied almost two weeks ago in a renewed offensive from the north against the secessionists.

According to witnesses in Umuahia as recently as Thursday, thousands of people there were trying to flee the city and were turned back by Biafran police and soldiers.
