**HERE WAS** this guest, Annie Patterson, on the mike talking over 5,000 watts about her wild idea.

Well, the fellows at the station interview a lot of way-out people, but they weren't prepared for this one. And then the phones lit up and callers drove them crazy for the rest of the day.

A reader of The Herald was indignant.

"I **DO NOT** hold with censorship in any form," wrote Jay Arnet of Coral Gables, "but I do believe in individual responsibility.

"This woman was given plenty of air time, and although the talk-man did not agree with her she monopolized most of the program. If there ever was yellow journalism, we have its counterpart in yellow radio."
