During December of 1978, I wrote to you concerning money owed to me by the House Select Committee on Assassinations. I received your answer, with the Stokes enclosure, after the first of the year and would like to thank you for your interest.

In Mr. Stokes letter to you, he pointed out that I never worked for the H.S.C.A. But, yet, several weeks after that I received a check for \$505.15, far short of the amount I submitted. Whether or not I worked for the H.S.C.A. by his side-stepping definition is beside the point. If I had not worked for them, then why any payment at all.

In August of 1978, I made allegations against the H.S.C.A. saying that they were involved in unethical, if not, illegal, activities. The H.S.C.A. investigated itself and cleared itself of any wrongdoing! I couldn't believe it and still can't.

Because of both the money being wowed to me, and, the way the members of this committee have skirted the truth in reporting their actual activities to you and to other members of Congress, I intend to pursue this matter.

I would like to have the opportunity to present to you, and to Congress, proof that I have that certain H.S.C.A. members were involved in unethical and possibly illegal activities. Not

being an attorney, I can only guess, that certain members of the H.S.C.A. could be held legally responsible for these actions.
