Concerning this evidence and information about the FBI's penetration of the Invaders group in Memphis, you stated that you were not prepared at that time to give a "detailed outline of what the evidence was."

Sir, I realize that you are a busy man and thus I am requesting that Newsday be granted an interview with your agent or department most knowledgeable about the King case, specifically: The Invaders group and 2. the Bureau's laboratory work concerning evidence at the ocene of the crime.
