Despite the odds against us years ago I believe that if Fensterwald had taken a different approach with which he had agreed and if he had selected a different local lawyer the case would have been different after the evidentiary hearing. I think we could have won that and would have, if not before Mac^Rae on appeal if he had taken the approach I'd pressed on him and with which he'd finally agreed. And then didn't.

What you conclude with is provocative. I hope it works and I do look forward to reading it.
