Enclosed is my response to the letter to David or Margaret of which I sent you a copy. If she has not, perhaps you might, when you have time, ask him for me whether he can undertake to represent me in a matter of collecting what I believe is due me from a publisher - speak only in generalities, as though you know nothing about it - and if he says it is possible, then prior to going to New York I will write for an appointment and if he makes it I will bring the entire files, most of which I have already copied for this purpose. David may have thought I was kidding, but I wasn't. I did this before leaving on the trip. I was perpared to initiate something then but go: a letter promising to provide what I'd ask for and therefore held off. I will, however, have to avoid making any copies for the immediate because my habit in usin; the copying machine would have me doing automatically what is proscribed for that thumb. It is that that joint of that thumb with which I customarily lift the lid, and I just can't afford to take a needless chance of inflicting further damage.

Enjoyed Ed's visit. You did not exaggerate the speed with which he reads. If I hadn't seen it I'd never believe it. He is refreshingly sharpm corrective and understanding, a rare mind. I am sorry he feels it necessary to leave, if I understand it.
