

As in all other instances in which his book and his formula for it required dishonesty, Posner is ~~capable~~ equal to his self-imposed demand to insist that in New Orleans Oswald was always <sup>were</sup> all alone when he knew that was not so. There also he gives himself away, getting away with it because all those who abandoned all critical faculties and praised him and his book to the heavens when their function, their responsibility in a society like ours is to question. Instead they <sup>of checking</sup> lavished unquestioning praises on him.

It is his compulsion to pretend to be scholarly, to have all those end notes, his the more important cover for all that is not sourced and usually cannot be, that led him to expose himself.

He hangs it up with a touch of high-school journalism in writing about Oswald's handbill and his distribution of it. (Page 127) He is not content to refer to that handbill, copies of which have been published and republished widely, or even to just quote its language. He takes a third of a page to reproduce it in type, line for line. <sup>from the J.W. Print ing Company,</sup> He precedes this saying that "Using the name Lee Osborne," Oswald ordered those handbills. Were it not for his unending pretenses of newness and uniqueness, easy to palm off on the uninformed, he could merely have cited the Commission Report for all of this. But that would not do for this derring-do "investigator," <sup>file</sup> and <sup>about "Osborne"</sup> his pretense of uniqueness. Even though, word for word, what he wrote comes from that Report, page 728!

Instead of citing the Commission's Report or the volumes he said he read and indexed <sup>years ago</sup> as his source, or innumerable other books that also published what he here does, he has <sup>In his own words</sup> to pretend real scholarship. So, his end note, which really cites no more than the well-publicized language of that handbill, refers to an FBI report published by the Commission. As this appears in his sources (page 526) it read, "FBI report, December 4, 1963, of interview with Myra Silver...."

Does he have Myra Silver's name in his text? No. (index, page 603)

Now there is no need to be too harsh in this matter. Her name also does not appear <sup>(index, page 497)</sup> in the Report or the <sup>Index, page 497</sup> witness testimony (p. Index, page 497) This is to say that the Commission was no more anxious for the truth than Posner.

But the Commission knew exactly what Posner knew about what Silver told the FBI.  
Posner did not have to use my files ~~on that in which he did work~~. He had it, as did the Commission, in that FBI report that does more than what Posner used and cited it for, ~~report that~~, "Lee Osborne" <sup>ed</sup> ordering of those handbills and its mailing.

It quotes Myra Silver as saying what she and her employer, Douglas Jones, told me, that it was not Oswald who got that print job when Jones completed it. They were both quite forceful in this and both examined the same large sheaf of photographs and both rejected the pictures of Oswald in them and both selected the same man as the one who picked that print job up.

The FBI was not about ~~to~~ to say this. Special Agent John McCarthy knew very well what would happen to him if he did. So he was a bit circumlocution in saying the same thing in a different way, "MRS. SILVER was shown a photograph of LEE HARVEY OSEALD, at which time she ~~said~~ stated she could not identify the person represented in the picture as the person who placed the order for the handbills." (23H797)

It is not necessary to needle Posner about his endless false boasts of having indexed that 10,000,000 words in addition to all else he did, allegedly, in ~~so~~ short a period of time, to hoist him on his own pertard. He does that to himself in citing this Commission exhibit, No. 1410, as his source for "Osborne" being Oswald when he ordered those handbills, when that exhibit is ~~quite~~ explicit in saying that it was not Oswald.

So, still again. Posner himself makes a liar of himself.

Marina and Ruth and Michael Paine said Oswald was a Trotskyite Marxist.<sup>22</sup> Trotskyites were the heart of the Socialist Workers Party, the key element in the Fair Play for Cuba Committee.<sup>23</sup>

Without waiting for a formal reply from the national office, Oswald acted as though he had permission to start an independent chapter. Picking up where he left off with his Dallas demonstration on behalf of Fair Play, he decided to begin passing out leaflets in New Orleans, but on a grander scale. On Wednesday, May 29, he went to the Jones Printing Company, opposite the side entrance of the Reily company. Using the name Lee Osborne, he said he needed a thousand handbills. He handed the receptionist an 8-by-10-inch sheet of paper on which he had written:

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Again under the alias Osborne, he ordered five hundred copies of a yellow, 4-by-9-inch membership application for his Fair Play for Cuba "chapter" from the Mailers' Service Company on Magazine Street.<sup>25</sup> Next, also with Mailers' Service, he placed an order for three hundred 2½-by-3½-inch membership cards.<sup>26\*</sup> By June 4, when Oswald picked up the thousand handbills from the Jones Printing Company, he had received a response from Fair

\*The question of how Oswald could afford such large printing orders on his minimal income has led some to suggest he had secret sources of funding. Oswald paid cash for all the orders. The 1,000 flyers cost \$9.89; the 500 membership applications were \$9.34; and the 300 membership cards cost \$3.50. The \$22.73 printing costs came in a month in which Oswald's total income was \$157.58, and with only \$44 on housing for the prorated month, he had more than enough for the printing costs (WC Report, App. XIV; Burcham Ex. 1, WC Vol. XIX, p. 192).

Sgt. On May 25, 1964, a person who she  
understood gave him name as OSBORNE appeared at the Jones  
Printing Company and placed an order for "1000 copies of a  
handbill, a rough draft of which I submitted on 8 x 10  
looseleaf paper. She stated that the handbill read as follows:

Sgt.

On a day in late spring or early summer of 1963, which was approximately two years ago, I was on the northeast corner of Main and Envoy Streets and observed an unidentified white male on the northeast corner of Main and Envoy Streets. This white male was passing out a sort of literature, and had a sign on his back which read "PILES CASTRES".

I went to the phone in Dryfoos & Son and called for Sgt. D. J. Harrison to meet me on the corner. While I was waiting for Sgt. Harrison to meet me on the corner, while I was waiting for Mr. Hill, Commissioner H. Padron Hill came across the street and said "Something should be done about this guy passing out literature". Mr. Hill seemed to be very angry.

About this time, Sgt. Harrison drove up on his three-wheel motorcycle and stopped on the northeast corner where I was standing. He said he was about to discuss the situation with the vehicle he had on his back and ran into H. L. Owen Company. I started the engine and he got off his motorcycle to let his go. Another white male told me that when Sgt. Harrison came up, this unidentified white male said "Oh, hell, here come the cops."

This unidentified white male was of medium weight and height and had on a white shirt and was bare headed. I can not identify this white male because he was across the street and I was waiting for Sgt. Harrison to make the initial contact with him.
