Rodney King said he wasn't driving the truck when it crashed into a wall and resulted in his arrest on a drunk driving charge Saturday, state parole officials said yesterday.

The Los Angeles police beating victim reportedly told his parole officer his cousin was be driving the 1986 Chevrolet Blazer when it

Police said tests indicated that King had a blood-alcohol level of 0.19 percent, more than twice California's legal drunk-driving limit of 0.08. He was arrested for investigation of misdemeanor drunk driving and ordered to appear in traffic court Sept. 15.

Book: No Conspiracy

A new book on the Kennedy assassination,, claims to have proven once and for all that Leef Harvey Oswald acted alone, according to an excerpt in this week's issue of U.S. News and World Report.

The new book, "Case Closed," employs an a extensive re-examination of the Warren Commission report, 200 interviews, computer enhancements of the famed Zapruder film and scale re-creations using computer animation attempting to end speculation that anyone other than Oswald shot Kennedy.

Author Gerald Posner argues that the socalled "magic bullet" did strike both Kennedy, and then-Texas Gov. John Connally and that Oswald had time to fire three times.

In attacking critics of the single-bullet theory, Posner relied on a computerized threedimensional re-enactment of the scene recorded in the Zapruder film.
