If your media contacts in England include any who might be interested in this new book, possible one that was beaten for ancillary rights to Posner's mistitled <u>Case</u> <u>Closed</u>. I'm sure the publisher would be pleased. They are Richard Gallen/Carroll & Graf, both, although officed separately, at 260 Fifth Avenue, New York 10001.
