This letter is classified LIMITED OFFICIAL USE because of the attachments. It may be declassified upon removal, of the same.



As you know, Supt, Saula recently made an official trip to the U. S. for surgice of studying Presidential procentorecannes and visiting various Poteral and local law

The press this week has made reference to an article apporting in the "U.S. Nows & Harld Report" magasine of 6/8/64 abtributing cortain statements to 8780A conserving his observations during the trip. SASSA has explosed that the article, wasten by an American reporter in Japan, Clan Presistrup, was based as an informal discussion which was intended to be "off the reserd", and contained many scribus imacouracies.

England for your informables are esples of the following, consider to this effice by SASSA, who ected that they be provided to each of you. SASSA acted also that I cannot to you his explicates for not esping in personally with this material, but he said he fold ture you would understand, how busy he is at this particular time.

- (1) Article titled "NEW LACIT ON THE ASSASSINATION: A SECRET ACCIDITS STORY" appearing on pages 33 and 39 of "U. S. Nawa & World Report" Engasine of 6/3/64.
- (2) Statement signed by TROELSTRUP, SASSA and others, undated, but made on 6/2/64.
- (3) Supplemental statement signed byTROELSTRUP, dated 6/3/64.
- (4) Article in Japan Times of 6/3/64.

SASSA advised that the fire statements enclosed (items 2 and 3) were signed by TROBLETHUP only upon SASSA's accurance that they would be used only for efficient purposes, and would not be node public. He asked that this restriction be specifically emphained to you.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. J. LEE RANKIN

SUBJECT: Changes in Secret Service Procedure since Assassination

as a result of our conference today with Mr. Kelly and Mr. Moore of the Secret Service, I was called by Mr. Kelly this afternoon. He informed me that the Secret Service has not changed its procedures since the assassination of President Kennedy except that President Johnson is now riding in a closed car. He informed me that no changes had been made in the deployment or arrangements of Secret Service personnel in the Presidential car contrary to the news reports that I had seen indicating that such was the fact. He did state that Secret Service was employing a few additional men in its protective measures.

At the meeting today you requested Mr. Kelly to supply you with all memoranda or other materials pertaining to studies or investigations made by the Secret Service subsequent to the assassination. You also asked, as I recall, that the Secret Service supply the Commission with a formal statement of their recommendations regarding improvements in measures designed to protect the President. You suggested that this Commission may wish to make in its formal report certain recommendations regarding the responsibility of the Secret Service which would enable the Secret Service to perform its job more effectively.

If you wish me to prepare a confirmatory letter to Mr. Rowley regarding this request, I will do so. Otherwise, I will make a note of this conference and check seven or ten days from now to see if any response has been received from Secret Service.
