Ranfzel, 39, expert on JFK death

BERKELEY — Robert Gardner Ranfzel, an expert on the assassination of President John F. Kennedy whose work pressured Congress to reopen the case, collapsed and died Jan. 29 near his home in Berkeley. He was 39.
 Mr. Ranfzel was one of several researchers who, in 1974, success-

fully pushed the Senate Select Committee on Assassination to reopen an investigation of Kennedy's shooting.
 In 1977, Mr. Ranfzel, through a series of Freedom of Information lawsuits, was able to persuade the FBI to release files on Kennedy's assassination.
 Mr. Ranfzel also wrote several books on Kennedy's assassination.
 "The community of investigative reporters is small, and the losses are felt acutely. There are not enough people like Robert to go around," said longtime colleague and friend Julia Gliden.
 According to friends, Mr. Ranfzel was beginning to work on the plight of the homeless and mental-health advocacy.
 "He is a person who overcame personal adversity to become a constant positive driving force in both his professional and personal life," said Gliden.
 Information on survivors was not available.
 Mr. Ranfzel's body was flown to Syracuse, N.Y., where he was born. Memorial services were held there on Tuesday.
