The clipping is quite provocative. It seems to suggest that you and Ray got out at the same time.

Years ago I spent many hours, in fact days, with him at "rushy Mountain and Mashville pens and hours more during the hearing, for which I was the investigator. My recollection is that he made no mention of enyone else being with him when he escaped.

If I remember correctly, he told me that the bread-box story is the correct one. NoPen's investigation did dicalose that the bread was pressed down much when it got to the farm.

Of course I'm interested in more than the escape, if you know or believe anything or know others who do.

Indo approclate your writing because my interest in this matter continues and I do plan to write another book when it is possible for me.
