But District Attorney General John Pierotti, who has called the case "a sham and a fraud," said he will not grant immunity to anyone claiming to have been part of a King murder conspiracy.

Pierotti's remarks came as the ABC's "PrimeTime Live" prepared to air an interview last night with Memphis businessman Lloyd Jowers, who said he hired someone other than Ray to carry out the April 4, 1968, killing.

Ray, who has long maintained his innocence in the slaying, is serving a 99-year sentence.

A London newspaper, The Observer, reported last weekend that a Memphis businessman said he arranged King's murder in exchange for a \$100,000 payment from two men, including one with alleged links to the Mafia.

Sen. Hutchison Reasserts Innocence

■ AUSTIN, Tex.—Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison (R) reasserted her innocence against charges she has called a political witch hunt.

In a court appearance, she denied the charges, which effectively ended her political career after she was convicted of four felonies and one misdemeanor.

Hutchison, 50, all but one of the felonies and equipment in the case were state treasure. She also was a member of the Texas Comptroller's office in Austin. She
