

New York A study by the American Medical Association released yesterday says President Kennedy was killed by a lone assassin and was hit by only two bullets that entered his

The study completely supports the conclusions reached by the official Warren Commission, which probed the November 22, 1963, assassination.

Dr George Lundberg, editor of the Journal of the Medical American Association, said the association based its conclusions on extensive intervlews with the pathologist who examined Kennedy's body immediately after the assassination and who has kept silent until now.

Dr Lundberg said that he and an associate inter-viewed Kennedy autopsy pathologists Dr James Humes and Dr J. Boswell, and also talked to the other doctors who attended the

"I can state without concern or question that President Kennedy was struck and killed by two, and only two, bullets fired from one high-velocity rifle," Dr Lundberg said.

"Both bullets struck from behind. No other bullets struck the President. A single assassin fired both."

Dr Lundberg said the autopsy findings could not state who fired the rifie, whether there were shots that missed or whether Lee Harvey Oswald, Kennedy's assassin, worked with organised crime in New Orleans or with the Central Intelligence Agency.
