#### ROBERT V. WENZLER

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The said witness, having been first duly sworn, testified as follows:

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## DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. LESAR:

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Q. Mr. Wenzler, for the record, would you state your current address?

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A. 4100 Ward Avenue.

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Q. And at the time of the James Earl Ray case could you state what your business was?

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A. I was a senior survey party chief for the City of Memphis.

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Q. And in that capacity did you execute an affidavit which was filed with the London court for the extradition of James Earl Ray?

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A. I executed an affidavit for the attorney general here, yes, sir.

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Q. On June 10, 1968?

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A. The exact date I don't remember.

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THE COURT: You are still lowering your

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voice. Speak up, sir.

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# BY MR. LESAR:

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Q. Is that a copy of an affidavit which you executed?

THE WITNESS: All right, sir.

Q. And attached to this affidavit is a letter from a Mr. Frank C. Holloman, director, Division of Fire and Police, City of Memphis, from a A. C. Holbrook, plans and design division. Was that attached to the affidavit also? Are you familiar with that?

- A. Yes.
- Q. What is the relation of Mr. Holbrook to you at that time?
- A. Mr. Holbrook was the office engineer in charge of the field force for the City of Memphis.
- Q. On page 2 of that letter I direct your attention to the first paragraph. Would you read it for us?
- A. (Reading)

"The windowsill from the building from which
the shot was fired is sixteen point three feet
higher than a point fifty-nine inches above the
floor of the balcony on which Dr. King was standing
when shot."

Q. Now, this says that the windowsill of the building from which the shot was fired was sixteen point three feet higher than a point fifty-nine inches above the floor of the balcony.

Was the survey which was attached to this based on these figures?

autopsy, and ask you -- are you familiar with that chart?

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A. No, sir.

Did you ever see it before?

Q. What does it reflect?

MR. HAILE: Object to that autopsy testimony or any testimony about a document he has never seen. I don't understand what he is trying to prove through this witness, and I don't see how this witness can testify about an autopsy that he didn't do and charts he has never seen.

He did a triangulation.

THE COURT: I think we can ask the witness what he did. There ought to be a way of finding out.

MR. HAILE: I am not objecting to that. I am just objecting to all this other thing about how Dr. King was standing and what the autopsy report shows and all that stuff.

MR. LESAR: I think it is simply a matter of reading numbers that are written on the autopsy chart and the relevance will be clear.

- Q. Is there a maximum given there for the distance between the heel of Dr. King in an upright position to his mouth?
- A. It shows sixty-one inches.
- Q. And does it also show the location of the wounds on Dr. King?
- A. If I am reading it right it shows the wound on the right cheek and also one on the neck.
- Q. And the top of those two wounds is somewhat lower than

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the sixty-one inches?

- The wound on the cheek is just a little lower than the sixty-one inches, yes.
- And it would be a reasonable inference from that that the fifty-nine inches may have been drawn from that calculation?

MR. HAILE: Your Honor, I object to the inference.

THE COURT: I don't know how this witness can say what the reasonable inferences are. I can do that.

### BY MR. LESAR:

- Let me ask you this, then: When you drew this survey did you ever consider or were you ever instructed to calculate angles from any other location than between the bathroom window in the Lorraine Motel?
- A. No, sir.
- And were you ever questioned by any defense attorney about the survey that you made?
- Defense attorney, no, sir.

MR. LESAR: Thank you. That's all, Your Honor.

#### CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. HAILE:

Were you ever questioned by these attorneys before today?
