I am not happy about any correspondence in which you can or will agree to such restrictions as you indicatem in part because they are an unreasonable imposition by Balin which makes me wonder on that count and in part because you may well be right in thinking he has crossed the line, which case you may become bulnerable. I have refused to correspond with those who were supplying useful information for less. Particularly because I think all of this is of significane to the paast only do I have apprehensions about running any risk w thout at least commensurate gain. Furthermore, especially if he interposed these restrictions, whatever they are, unilaterally, without your prior agreement, I t ink they are quite wrong. You are sufficiently lacking in experience and in some areas of the evidence for you to seek advice. I would not welcome this because I can't keep up now and those things no longer interest me, but should you decide this way, I will. Which reminds me, if you would like to come down again before school, a good week would be that of the 23rd, when Lil will be working. By then I have to have completed the draft of the rest of PM. I'm having to do it in haste and could use suggestions and criticisms. Som if you'd like to discuss anything about Belin, and I'm not trying to influence the decision, which has to be yours, that would be a good time.... There has to be something wrong when, as I now notice, you can't even word disclose his conditions ... Although he is not one of the more important, some of the minor things he handled are among the more important, and if he has any doubts about his own record, which he sure as hell should, you'd best be dareful. I feel no burden in this. I've not mentioned it to anyone and frankly, thing that unless you can do what would seem to be close to impossible, get him to open up, this is largely a waste of time. Sylvon, for all her great brilliance, is a captive of the past because she is so restricted, and her evaluations in a comparison of how time can well be spent may not be the best. There seems to be were something very wrong about this and I don't know what but I do know you'd best watch carefully and take no chances at all, not matter how seemingly insignificant. Nor is it impossible that he has phoned Specter.
