Dear Harold,

As usual, once the school year sets in, I got very much behind on filing your correspondence, and even in reading some. I had been wondering why I had gotten no response from you on my request about my "noise pollution" research project, and as I now just went through about 5 envelopes of letters~~x~~ from you, I see that you did indeed respond immediately. The course for which I have to do that research I am not taking for a grade, but rather for a Pass/Fail rating, that is, if I pass I get credit for taking the course, if I fail, I get a failing grade. That means I get to take the course but am not under pressure to devote as much time or energy to it as I must to more important courses, especially my thesis. As it turns out, the course is shamefully simple, geared, doubtlessly, to the football players of the school and all those others whose only contribution is satisfying the Daddy-Bigbucks trustees whose fat contributions help keep the school going. What I'm getting at is that the paper I do for this course does not have to be a masterpiece, and that is just as well, since my prime concern is in writing my thesis and devoting time to 2 other heavy reading courses I have. With a professor, however, it would be a different case, and I think his evaluation of me could well be influenced if he wrote it thinking I would see it at some point.

I'm sending a couple things under separate cover. I hope everything is well with you and Lil. My best to both of you, and I hope to see you soon. *Harold*
