Dear Sir:

In recent weeks I have been lecturing throughout the Mid-West to college students, high schools, and community groups on the assassination of John F. Kennedy and in the course of my presentation I give a critical examination of the literature available for a citizen to read on the question. Since I have done extended study of the subject and have written articles and published an annotated bibliography through the State Historical Society of Wisconsin which presents a critical examination of all the books up to 1973 my comments I feel are informed. Howard Roffman's Presumed Subject published by your press is the best single, i.e., one volume approach, for the layperson as well as the scholar. I always and indeed must cite it and give commentary on its outstanding merits.

Sadly, I have seen no advertisements on the book in the scholarly journals and have seen no references whatsoever to it in the several journals of informed opinions where a book of such outstanding quality and of such import to the solution of the assassination normally would be spotted by those searching for information. To make my point and give ordering information to the audiences that I speak to I have been forced to reproduce the little one page flyer that appeared in a general mailing some months ago.

Why should such an excellent book be restricted by the press that published it? Your press should be honored to be the publisher of such a scholarly volume and ought be forwarding it for several prizes available to authors.
