Dear Mr. Roffman:

This is in reply to your letter of July 22, 1977, concerning your FOIA request for records relating to Mr. Harold Weisberg's efforts to obtain a copy of the "Memorandum of Transfer" of material relating to the autopsy of President Kennedy.

No letter from Mr. Weisberg dated January 19 or 20, 1969, requesting a copy of the "Memorandum of Transfer" has been found. The earliest letter making this request that we have is dated February 28, 1969. All of Mr. Weisberg's letters are kept in one file. Copies of our correspondence with him concerning the memorandum will be furnished to you as soon as we receive the written authorization and release you have promised to obtain from Mr. Weisberg.

You may construe the response in Item No. 5 of our letter of July 19, 1977, as a blanket statement that there are no records concerning the meeting in the conference room of the Director of the Secret Service in our administrative files. Naturally, we cannot speak for the other agencies.

We do not have a record of Mr. Marshall's oral request. You may be able to obtain information concerning the request from the Office of General Counsel of GSA.
